



SAFETY



Here are a few tips for a safer summer.

Stay Close, Be Alert and Watch

- -Always watch your children and never leave them unattended
- -Keep children away from pool drains, pipes and other openings
- -Have a cell phone close by at all times
- -If a child is missing, check the pool first
- -Share safety information with family, friends, and neighbors
- -Don't allow adults who have been drinking alcohol in the pool area



Learn and Practice Water Safety Skills

- -Learn to swim
- -Know how to preform CPR on children and adults
- -Understand the basics of life saving so that you can assist in a pool emergency

Have the Appropriate Equipment

- -Install a fence around the perimeter of the pool and spa of at least four feet
- -Use self-closing and self-latching gates
- -Ensure all pools and spas have compliant drain covers
- -Install a door alarm from the house to the pool area
- -Maintain pool and spa covers in working order



RESILIENCE



It is important to know, if a major disaster occurs, the LAFD, paramedics, police...may not be available to respond. They will be deployed FIRST to major incidents such as collapsed buildings. That is why you constantly hear...You MUST be prepared to take care of yourself. In the CERT course they say..."The Greatest Good for the Greatest Number of People." When you are trained, you are far more equipped to deal with your circumstances without needing aid from outside sources.

CERT members are trained in basic disaster response skills such as fire safety, light search and rescue, team organization and disaster medical operations. You will learn how to prepare for emergencies, what supplies you should NOW have in your house, how much food, how much water but most importantly, how to protect your family in an emergency!

The CERT program training is a valuable course designed to help you protect yourself, your family, your neighbors and your neighborhood in an emergency situation. Members receive 17 1/2 hours (one day a week for seven weeks) of initial training. CERT is provided free of charge within the city of Los Angeles to anyone 18 or over.

There are several classes coming to the Valley:

May 10th - Cahuenga Pass

June 14th - Laurel Canyon

July 10th - Chatsworth

If these don't work for you, we will come to your location. Classes can be held anywhere in the City of Los Angeles.


